13 September 2006 prayer letter

It has been quite awhile since I last wrote. I have been spending a lot of time in the bush. When I have come back to town there has been no electric so I figure I might as well stay out.

We have seen some wonderful things happen.

I went out to a place called Senya, showed the Jesus film, and had twenty Maasai receive Christ. I am going to start going out once a week and doing a Bible study there. It is about a three-hour drive to nowhere.

I got lost driving in the bush last week. I was at a boma about sixty miles out and it got dark on me. I decided I was going to try to drive to the church. Well, I was wandering around like a chicken with it's head cut off. I was getting low on diesel and doing a lot of praying. When there are no roads everything looks the same in the dark. I drove around for about four hours before I was able to figure out where I was. At one point, it got so dark up ahead, I could not see even with my high beams on. I stopped, got out of the car, and walked a little and there was a cliff with about a twenty foot drop. I guess my Angel kept me from driving over.

Church has been going great. It is such a blessing to be able to pastor my people. There is such a hunger and love for God's Word. Tonight, Wednesday, we were talking about the altar and the blood.

I have been really blessed with the friends that God has given me in town, Arusha. Two brothers that own the electronic store and several other things in town told me that they want to start giving our ministry four hundred dollars a month to help with church and medical needs. They let me have a thousand dollar sound system and said to just pay it off as I can. They do not care how long it takes. They have given me a fifteen hundred dollar generator. These guys are muslims. They say that what I do for my people speaks more of God to them then anything anyone has ever told them. I am praying that they and their families will be saved. They will sit and ask questions about the Bible for hours. One of the things that really gets them is the love of God. To a muslim, God and love do not go together. You will never hear a muslim talk about God's love. To them, God is a strict unloving authoritarian. He is to be obeyed as a slave would obey his master. To them, God does not want to be loved or have fellowship with man, just to be obeyed.

Oh, another thing. When I told the two brothers about being lost, they gave me a GPS unit.

Debi will be coming back in just a couple of weeks. Praise God. Michelle is getting settled in at Baptist Bible College.

The people at church are really looking forward to Debi being back. Every time we have church or I go to a boma they will ask; "When will Mama Michelle be here?"

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It is so cool to be a part of what God is doing here. What a blessing to be the one that He is using to do so much. I just cannot get over that God lets me do what I do.

I want you to understand the big part each of you has in this ministry. When you get to heaven there are going to be a lot of Maasai and Warusha that want to thank you for being part of their salvation.

Please keep praying.
